It was about time Paul met the one he was spending so much time writing with. He asked for a time to meet. You see Paul's daughter lived just a mile from Karen's house. Simple right? Not for Karen! A couple friends asked if she was still writing to that 'preacher guy'. "Yes, and he wants to meet me, but I don't want to meet him." "Why not? What do you got to lose." "When he sees me he won't like me, and he'll stop writing to me." (She is often positive about the negative.) And she was right- I stopped writing to her- we started calling each other. August 14, 2001 was the date set. I walked up on to her porch with a bouquet of flowers in my hand. She was watching for me and met me at the door and invited me in. We went to the Old Country Buffet for dinner. It was so easy to talk to each other like we had known each other for years. We visited a couple hours. That's how we met.

How long were you engaged? Paul proposed on June 8, 2003 – 2 ½ months.
